<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Sexual Deviance Variables <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Prior sexual offenses against two or more children under the age of twelve, with at least one unrelated child victim (male or female) - Sexual offenses as a juvenile (under age 18) and an adult

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Treatment <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Dropping out of sex offender specific treatment - Limited or no participation in sex offender treatment program

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • General Criminality / Lifestyle instability <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Childhood maladjustment as defined by two or more of the following instances: separated by more than 12-months - history of grade failure, psychiatric treatment, group home placement, or running away from home. - Criteria for conduct disorder met - Psychopathy (Hare Psychopathy Checklist-Revised (PCL-R of 30 or above) - Violation of conditional release or a new offense while on community supervision - Frequently unemployed as defined by the inmate being employed less than 50 percent of the last 12 months (or the 12 months prior to incarceration)
